DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Which main character resonates more with you, Mimi or Sakina? Why?
- Who was your favorite secondary character? What did you like best about them?
- Sakina is very different from an American girl because she works for a living, and helps support her family. What did you learn about privilege and poverty after reading about Sakina's life, and how did this help you reassess your own?
- Mimi isn't truly connected with her heritage until she arrives in Pakistan. What are some ways she forms those connections during her summer vacation? How do her grandparents help in this regard?

- What role does food play in bringing the two girls closer together? How does the author use food as a way to build understanding and connection with readers?
- Mimi and her mother have always been very close. How does this visit to Pakistan affect the way Mimi views her mother? Do you think things will change between them when they go back to Houston?
- This is ultimately a story of an unlikely friendship with a rocky start. What did you learn about making friends from Mimi and Sakina? What are some ways you can reach out to someone very different from you?
- There is an election in the background of the story. How is it similar to election campaigns in the U.S. and how is it different?
- There are several unanswered questions at the end of the book. Will Mimi and her father continue to meet and grow closer together when they get back to the U.S.? Will Mimi ever see Sakina again? How will Sakina's family manage if Sakina goes to school? If you were the author, how would you continue the story after the last page?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- Mimi visits her grandparents in Pakistan for the first time. Have you ever visited family members in another country or city, and found the experience very different from your own? What did you find different? How did you cope with the changes?
- Mimi and Sakina both have big dreams that seem impossible to achieve. Yet by working together, they achieve their dreams. Do you have a dream that seems impossible, and how do you think you could achieve it?
- Mimi and Sakina are as different from each other as night and day. Still, they make an effort to get to know each other, and learn each other's languages. Have you ever tried to learn another language? How difficult was it? What did you learn from the experience?
- Mimi's mother is an artist, and her father is a journalist. Sakina's father is a chef. What are some possible careers you could see yourself in?
